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





FIRST AUSTRALIAN DIVISION ORDER No. 20.

Divisional Headquarters. 19th April, 1917.

- 1. Gas projectors will be used against the enemy on the night 20/21st, April should the wind be favourable.

 A South Westerly wind is required for the operation.

 The projectors will be fired from K.7.d.

 The objective will be the enemy's position about LOCK 6 Sq. K.3.a.
- 2. The discharge will be supplemented by a brief artillery gas shell bombardment on the enemy trenches in Sq. K.3.a. and K.3.c. commencing at zero hour.
- 3. Zero hour will be Z a.m.
- 4. Authority to discharge the projectors will be given by G.O.C., lat. Brigade at 2 a.m. on 21st instant by the following priority wire to G.R.A. and O.C. "H" Company Special Brigade, D.H.Q. and G.O's in Right Sector "Goods will be delivered".

 If the wind is unfavourable the following priority wire will be sent to the same addresses "No Action".

 O.C. "H" Company Special Brigade will arrange to keep in touch with 1st. Brigade Headquarters through Headquarters 10th. Battalion or Headquarters 4th. Battalion.
- 5. All troops will be warned and those in the forward area Bast of a North and South line through LOUVERVAL DOIGNIES will wear gas helmets in the alert position.
- 6. Hostile enemy artillery fire is to be enticipated in retaliation.
- 7. Watches will be synchronised with 1st. Aust. Div. Signal Company at 12 noon and 6 p.m. on 20th. instant.

1. On 21st April, C.O.8th Battalion obtained permission from the G.O.C. 2nd Brigade to capture the enemy's strong post at

Sq. D.14.c.5.5.

Preliminary reconnaissances had discovered that the post was strongly wired. Two small openings were known to exist in the wire immediately in front of our positions. It had been ascertained also that only one sentry post was employed to watch the right flank of the post in the valley. It was known that the enemy had machine guns within the post one of which had been located and the garrison of the post estimated to be 50 or 60.

- 2. It was decided to make a diversion against the enemy's flank in such a manner as to threaten his retreat and while he was occupied in dealing with this to endeavour to rush the post from the front. The hour selected for the attack was 4 a.m. and patrols kept NO MAN'S LAND clear during the night.
- Direct liaison was arranged between the 8th Battalion and a battery of artillery. Each man carried 220 rounds S.A.A. and two Mills bmobs, rifle grenadiers were well supplied with grenades. Wire cutting parties were told off with wire cutters and a small carrying party was detailed to follow up the attack with a supply of tools, S.A.A. and bombs. A telephone party was also told off to follow up the attack and open communication from the post.
- 4. At 3.45 a.m. the attacking force, strength 4 Officers and 70 O.R. was formed up im two parties, one in front of the enemy's post and the other in the right flank so posted as to move against the enemy's rear. Each party was formed up in two lines and a Lewis Gun was placed 50 yards to the left of the party attacking the enemy's front.
- 4 a.m. the flank party attacked with bombs while wire cutters endeavoured to cut gaps through the wire. The enemy thus found his flank and rear threatened and his attention was entirely diverted from the front. The main party was enabled to push through the gaps which had already been discovered in the wire and rush the post. The enemy machine gun opened fire but the Lewis Gun placed on the flank of the main attack was so well posted that it was enabled to keep the enemy amchine gun quiet by means of short bursts of fire. The flank party was then able to enter the post and join up with the main party.
- 6. A protective screen was at once moved out to the front and the flanks. One party pursued the enemy down the sunken road for a distance of about 100 yds. and established a small block with a Lewis Gun. The battery of artillery kept up a steady fire covering the position.

7. It was not intended to hold the position if it appeared likely to necessitate an undue number of casualties and the party was withdrawn accordingly during the morning.

Our wasualties during the action were one killed and 14 wounded. Enemy casualties were three casualties taken, 19 killed and a number known to be wounded. A machine gun tripod and machine

gun were captured.

The attack was skilfully planned and was carried out with great determination by the men and it was due to this combined with the excellent leadership shown by the Officers that the action was attended with such success.

## FIRST AUSTRALIAN DIVISION CROOK No. 22.

Divisional Headquarters,
April 22nd 1917.

on "Z" day the 2nd Australian Division is attacking the enemy in co-operation with the 62nd Imperial Division on its left. The front of attack is from Sheet 57c N.W. Sq. J.30.a. 4.4. to a point northwest of BULIECOURT.

The attack will be made by 5th and 6th Aus. Brigades.
The objectives of the attack are shown on a map issued

herewith to those concerned.

- 2. (a) The 1st Inf. Brigade will be attached to 2nd aus. Division from noon on "Y" day. At this hour Brigade Headquarters will be established at "AVREUIL now occupied by 7th Aus. Brigade.
  - (b) The nucleus garrison of the laft divisional sector of the ENAUMETZ MORCHIES VAULX line between MARICOURT Wood and Sq. C.13.central, now consisting of two battalions (one battalion each of 5th and 6th Aus. Brigades,) will be relieved by one battalion of 1st Brigade on the afternoon of "Y" day. The relief will be completed by 6 p.m.

This relief will be arranged by C.O.C. let Brigade direct with G.O.C. 5th and 6th Brigades. Completion will be reported

to 2nd Aus. Division Headquarters.

(c) The nucleus garrison of two battalions of Corps Main Line (ENUGNY-YTRES line) now furnished by 7th Aus. Brigade will be relieved by a similar garrison of 1st Inf. Brigade, under ar-rangements to be made by G.O.C. 1st Brigade with G.O.C. 7th Brigade on "Y" day.

Relief will be completed by 3 p.m. and completion will

be reported to 2nd aus. Division.

- (d) Brigade Headquarters and the remaining bettalion of 1st Brigade will be in divisional reserve in the BLUGNATRE-FAVREUIL irea.
- 3. G.O.C. 1st Aus. Inf. Brigade will detail two platoons to report to A.P.M. 2nd Aus. Division at NORBUIL by 6 p.m. on "Y" day to assist in guard and escort duties.
- 4. Orders are being issued for the co-operation of the 5th Aus. Div. Artillery by C.R.A.
- 5. Watches will be synchronised with 2nd Aus. Div. Sig. Coy at 12.30.p.m. and 5.30.p.m. on "Y" day.

## FIRST AUSTRALIAN DIVISION SCHOOL.

#### TIRAUCOURT.

- 1. On 12th November 1916 1st. ANZAC ordered Divisional Schools to be established. A reconnaissance was made with a view to finding a suitable place for our School and TIRANCOURT Chateau near
  LA CHAUSSEE was the place decided upon.
- 2. The School was primarily founded with the view of training Officers and men in Infantry work and the course of instruction was to last 24 working days.
- 3. A suitable Staff was assembled with Lieut-Colonel
  A.B. STEVENS as Commandant. The 1st Course assembled on the 29th
  November and consisted of 44 Officers and 91 other ranks.
- 4. At the end of the 1st Course it was decided to extend the scope of the School to include the training of selected N.C.O's and men for commissions. These men were classed as Cadets and at the end of their course were classed in the following categories.
  - (a) Suitable for a direct commission.
  - (b) Recommended for further training at a Cadet School in England.
  - (c) Recommended for a further course at the Division School.
  - (d) To be sent back to their Units as unsuitable

31 Cadets attended the first course.

- The second course which assembled on the 1st January 1917 was extended for 1 week so that the students should have further field training.
- 6. Concurrently with the 2nd Infantry course a Signalling Course was ran weignallers from Infantry Units attended. In all three Signalling Courses were held and 2 Officers and 150 other ranks attended.
- 7. On the 17th March Lieut-Colonel A.B. STEVENS took over the 1st Australian Base Depot at ETAPLES, Major O. HARRIS acted as Commandant until Lieut-Colonel HILMER-SMITH took over the duties on the 26th March.
- 8. The total number of Students put through the School was 193 Officers, 138 Cadets and 571 other ranks. In all cases reports by Instructors and Commandant were sent to Divisional Headquarters. These reports proved very useful and were recorded at Divisional Headquarters. In the case of Officers, if the report was not good, the Officer was considered for supercession, if the report showed negligence the Officer was punished, either by stoppage of leave or by supercession. In all cases Battalion Commanders were instructed to keep close watch upon Officers who obtained bad reports and to be prepared to report on them if necessary.

In the case of N.C.O's the reports brought to notice

N.C.O's suitable for commissioned rank.

Action was taken on the reports on Cadets as indicated in

- Out of the 138 Cadets that attended the course, 40 have gained commissions, 66 have been sent to England, 18 have had further instruction and 14 rejoined Units.
- 9. The Divisional School was closely supervised by the Division--al Staff. Each course was inspected at least once by either the Divisional Commander or the G.S.O., and occasional lectures were

given by the Divisional Staff. All examination papers were submitted to the Divisional Commander for approval.

The value of the training received at the School was quickly felt throughout the Division and all Commanding Officers have been eager to send Students.

10. The School was closed on 1st May, 1917 by Corps Orders and was reopened as a Divisional Wing of the Corps School, the object being to economise in Staff.

#### FIRST AUSTRALIAN DIVISION.

Summary of Operations for the Week ending 12-4-17.

1. The relief of the 5th. Australian Division by the troops of the 1st. Australian Division was completed on the night 6/7th. April and at 9 a.m. 7th. the command of the divisional front passed to G.O.C. 1st. Australian Division.

2. On taking over the Infantry of the division was distributed as follows :-

1st.Aus.Inf.Bde. on the right with two battalions in front line (3rd. Battalion on right, 1st. Battalion on left) one Battalion (2nd.) in the BEUGNY - YTRES Line and one Battalion (4th.) in support in FREMICOURT.

3rd.Aus.Inf.Bde. on the left with two battalions in front line, (12th. Battalion on right, 9th. Battalion on left) one Battalion in the BEUGNY - YTRES Line (10th.) one Battalion (11th.) in support in sunken roads in the Ficinity of MORCHIES.

2nd.Aus.Inf.Bde. (less 1 Battalion and 1 Company on works) in Divisional Reserve about HAPLINCOURT and FREMICOURT.

- 3. The 5th. Australian Divisional Artillery plus the 14th. (Army) F.A. Brigade was already emplaced to cover the front of this Division, the 1st. Australian Divisional Artillery being attached to 4th. Australian Division.
- 4. In accordance with orders preparations were at once put in hand for the capture of HERMIES by noon 8th. April, but on the representations of the Divisional Commander the Corps Commander consented to postponing this deparation 24 hours.
- 5. On the night 7/8th. our patrols reconncitred the whole front with the object of gaining as much information as possible about the positions to be attacked and the left Brigade fought to gain the high ground lying N.W. of BOURSIES and succeeded in establishing themselves in a favourable position for an attack on that village. The enemy replied with heavy artillery and machine gun fire and the Brigade suffered about 90 casualties.
- On the 8th. plans were matured for the capture of HERMIES, DEMICOURT and BOURSIES on the early morning of the 9th. The 2nd. Battalion was relieved in the HEUGNY YTRES Line by a Battalion of the Reserve Brigade, to free it for the attack on HERMIES.
- 7. At 10.30 p.m. 8th. the enemy heavily counter-attacked the positions gained by the 12th. Battalion near BOURSIES on the previous night. Under heavy barrage of bombs the enemy gained a footing in the sunken road in J.5.c but was immediately ejected by a counter -attack delivered by a company of 12th. Battalion. Fighting in this locality continued until 1.30 a.m. 9th. and seriously interfered with the dispositions of the 12th. Battalion for the attack on BOURSIES timed for 4.30 a.m.
- 8. At 4.30 a.m. on 9th. simultaneouslassaults were delivered on HERMIES and BOURSIES by the 1st. and 3rd. Brigades respectively while DEMICOURT was kept under artillery fire.

The operation was wholly successful and resulted in the capture of HERMIES, DEMICOURT and BOURSIES together with one Officer 196 O.R. prisoners, a machine guns, a automatic rifles and a T.M's.

By night of 9th. our line was consolidated from the Ganal. du Nord (J.36.4.) East of the 3 captured villages to D.28. central where it connected with our old line.

A separate report dealing with this operation is in course of preparation.

9. During the 9th. the enemy was observed to be massing in HAVRINCOURT and a counter-attack on HERMIES was expected. Artillery fire was opened on HAVRINCOURT and the counter-attack did not materialize.

- Since the 9th. the enemy has been comparatively quiet on our front and oppositunity has been taken of this to improve our defences as follows :-
  - (i) Front line posts have been strengthened and in most cases the troops have made themselves cover from the weather.

(ii) A system of defence in depth is being organised Viz :-

(a) The advanced line of resistance.

(b) The Brigade reserve line. (c) The BEUGNY - YTRES Tene.

Garrisons have been detailed to these lines and

work on all of them is in hand.

(iii) Machine Guns have been mounted for A.A. defence in the neighbourhood of every considerable body of troops.

(iv) Some Strombos Horns have been installed and others are being put in position in accordance with a definite plan which will give warning throughout the whole Divisional Area.

SUMMARY of OPERATIONS for the Week ending 20th April, 1917.

The operations of the week have consisted mainly of 1. General. savaroing our line close up to the HINDENBURG line.

The actual move forward necessitated fighting at several points and the fact that we did move close to the enemy line brought on an attack by the enemy on a large scale.

The front which the Division holds measures 13.000

yarde and runs as follows :-

K.31.8.7.3 - SQUARE COPSE - K.20.8.4.8 - K.14.8.4.1 -K.7.c.8.8 - K.7.c.2.6 - J.6.b.2.0 - J.5.b. Central -D.29. Control - D.28.b.l.9 - D.22.c.8.4 - D.22.c.0.4 D.21.d.6.3 - D.20.d.7.3 - D.20.d.1.9 - D.14.c.Central D. 13. b. 0.4 - D.7. c. 7.1 - D. 7. c. 2.0.

2. Operations. (1) Our own.

(a) (b) & (c) On 13th April the Division was ordered to Edvance during the night to suitable positions within approximately 1.000 yards of the HINDENBURG line with the object of threatening that line to the East of QUEANT.

This involved an advance all along the Divisional front except on the left flank, for a distance of from

1.000 to 1.500 yards.

(d) Two Battalions in each Brigade sector were involved,

the 3rd, 4th, 9th and 11th Battalions.

(e) Considerable resistance was not during the advance, the Righr Brigade finding the enemy in force at K.7.c.8.7 and in SQUARE COPSE (K.25.d.) and the Left Brigade encountering strong posts at. D.21.a.O.4 and D.20.a.O.9. We captured 2 prisoners of 95 R.I.R. and one Lewis

Gum. Our casualties for 13th were O.R. 9 killed 37 wounded. (g)

Everywhere the enemy was driven out with loss and our line was advanced as ordered.

By the morning of the 14th our new line was estab--lished and organised in a series of strong posts, but there had been little time for digging and in many places no disging could be done in daylight.

The new line occupied then became the picquet line, the forward line of resistance of the Division, and the

old front line became the support line.

Owing to the boundaries of the Divisional Area being divergent this advance of 1.000 yards increased our already extensive front by approximately 1.000 yards.

(i a) During the night of 14th we made further slight advances to straighten our line and effort was concentrated on strengthening posts, and Owing to the extent of our front and our closeness to the enemy line supports were moved up from the Battalions in Brigade Reserve, one Battalion being sent up in the Left Brigade sector to reinforce the support line.

(ii) Fnemy.

(a) At 10 a.m. on the 14th the enemy rushed and occupied two of our sentry posts in the Left Brigade sector at D.23.d.2.8 and D.22.d.3.9 and captured 9 mon and one Lewis gun. The enemy was at once counter-attacked and driven out of these posts which we re-occupied. In the early morning of 15th the enemy in great strength attacked all along our front and also on part of the front of the 2nd Australian Division on our left, the attack being delivered in greatest strength against the front LAGNICOURT - NOREUIL.

At 3.30 a.m. heavy hostile artillery fire was developed against the villages in rear of our front line and against our battery positions. It was especially severe against HERMIES, DESICOURT, DOIGNIES, LAGNICOURT.

MORCHIES and their vicinities.

At 4.15 a.m. the enemy attacked along our whole front

in great force.

On our right Brigade front the attack was made in greatest strength against HERMIES, but was repulsed with very heavy losses to the enemy, 150 dead being counted on one Company's front alone. Further North in the vicinity of DEMICOURT and BOURSIES our troops were forced to give ground by sheer weight of numbers after inflicting severe casualties.

On our left Brigade front the company on the extreme left was holding a frontage of about 1.000 yards with three platoons in the line. After putting up a strenuous resistance found itself attacked both front and rear owing to the enemy having broken through the troops on its left flank.

The three platoons were overwhelmed. The support platoon resisted the enemy in Sq. C.18.2 until the attack worked round its left and rear. This company lost between 60 and 70 percent of its effectives.

The company on its right, although surrounded on three sides through the same cause held its ground and

continued to punish the enemy severely.

The Division on our left formed a defensive flank facing East and covering NOREULL. The attackers moved th through the gap and swung to the South and captured LAGHI-COURT.

One of our machine guns which had been moved to C.29.a.O.B inflicted very heavy casualties on the enemy as they attempted to come over the ridge in C.22.d and C.23.c.

The enemy pushed on to about the track running East and West through Sq.25.a.O.5. A counter-attack by two companies of the Brigade Reserve and the Reserve of the left Battalion in conjunction with a counter-attack by a Battalion of the 2nd. Australian Division on our left, succeeded in driving the enemy back to his original line with very heavy losses, many of them surrendering. From D.20.a.9.9 to the right of the Brigade front in J.5. our troops retired slowly in face of superior numbers to a line from two to three hundred yards in rear of their original line.

Throughout the engagement very heavy losses were inflicted on the enemy, being a conservative estimate of their dead left in front of our lines.

We captured prisoners and a machine gun. Our casualties were comparatively light.

We lost 4 machine guns and had 6 field guns damaged in LAGNIC OURT.

3. Patrols.

Our Activity.

Great activity has been maintained throughout the last week, no less than two Officers and 14 other patrols left our lines, only very few of these patrols met with resistance, and the location from which the resistance came was definitely located, and accordingly dealt with.

Enemy's Activity.

From all accounts enemy activity as regard patrols, seems far below normal; only three patrols, one of 6, and 2 of 3 men strong, have been seen during the last 7 days.

4. Machine Guns.

(i) Our own.

The distribution of our machine guns is generally as follows:- Lewis guns in the front line Vikkers guns in support and reserve lines and in defended Villages. Lewis or Vickers mounted for defence against aircraft in the neighbourhood of every considerable bidy of troops.

During the week the machine guns have been freely used both for direct and indirect fire. They were well handled and played a decisive part in repelling the enemy attack on 15th.

(ii) Fnemy.

The enemy has many machine guns on this front some of which have been located. Access to certain parts of our front line is unsafe by day on this account. LittlE indirect machine gun fare has been experienced.

#### 5. Trench Mortars.

(1) Our Trench Mortars. Have not been used.

(ii) Enemy.

On 19th the enemy used trench Mortar fire throughout the night against our posts in X.20.2 and K.7.d.5.5.

## 6. Artillery.

(i) Our own.

Our general policy has been (a) to engage at once any favourable target which presented itself and (b) by main--taining a close liaigon between Infantry and Artillery to ensure the instant co-operation of the guns in repelling any enemy counter-attack. As an instance of (a) on 20th. 2 enemy Battalions were caught in the open by field guns and heavies and dispersed. Generally speaking the volume of our artillery fire has been greater than that of the enemy during the period. As an instance of (b) on 15th. the enemy during his attack suffered heavy essualties from our artillery fire especially in the vicinity of his own wire. where many of his dead can be seen. (11) Enemy.

Front System. All villages in the front line system are consistently shelled, particularly LAGNICOURT.

The enemy has also searched sunken roads and has been quick to fire on any movement seen.

Intermediate Areas. The villages of MORCHIES, BEAUMETE, DOIGHIES and BEUGNY are regularly shelled.

The main Baraume - CAMBRAI road is also often shelled,

chiefly from BEAUMETZ to BEUGNY.

The enemy guns constantly search cor our heavy guns. The enemy shells are nearly all high explosive and guns and howitzers of all calibre are used up to 15cm.

## 7. Changes of Brigade Fronts.

The left boundary of the Division has been changed, reducing the frontage of the left Brigade by approximately 800 yards.



## SUMMARY OF OPERATIONS - 21st April to 25th April 1917.

#### 1. GENERAL.

There has been no general forward move during the period. The Division has been consolidating the Line gained during the recent operations. On the night of 21st/22nd April we raided a strong point at D.14.c.5.5. The relief of the Divisision took place on the 23rd, 24th and 25th inst.

#### 2. OPERATIONS.

our Activity.

(a) (b) (c).

on the night of 21st/22nd April a raid was organised to destroy a strong point at D.14.c.5.5. which was strongly wired. The garasion of the strong point was estimated at 50- 60 men and a Machine Gum.

to the right rear of the post and the other making a frontal

attack.

- (d) 4 Officers and 70.0.R. of the 8th Battalion made the raid.
- (a) The enemy developed strong resistance against the right rear party. The party making the frontal attack was met by machine gun fire which was quickly dealt with by eleverly placed Lewis Guns and carried by assault by both parties after hand to hand fighting.
- (f) Three prisoners were taken, 19 of the enemy were killed and a number of the enemy were wounded. The enemy were able to earry off their machine gun leaving however, the tripod. Our casualties were 1 killed and 14 wounded. We held the post until morning and then withdrew.

#### 3. PATROIS.

Our Activity.

Patrol activity has been maintained throughout the period.
Eleven Officers patrols, esixteen other patrols, and numerous contact and protective patrols leaving our lines. In all cases the patrols achieved their object.

## EMEMY ACTIVITY.

The enemy's patrol activity was below normal, only two small patrols of the enemy being met by our patrols.

#### 4. MACHINE GUNS.

our Activity.

Our machine guns have been employed on the following tasks:-

1. Dispersing hostile working parties.

2. Firing at anti-sireraft.

3. Miring by night on enemy's communications.

owing to our large front our machine guns have numerous alternate positions. This permits of intensive use of the guns by day.

## HOSTILE ACTIVITY.

Enemy machine guns have been active along our front. They frequently traversed posts in our front line by day and night, and fired frquently at our aircraft.

## 5. THEIRI MORTARS.

## 1. Our Activity.

Our trench mortars have not been in action during the periunder review owing to the enemy line being out of range of our L.T.M. except in one place which is too exposed for their use.

## 2. Enemy activity.

The enemy constantly fired bombs into our front posts. Fortunately the shooting was erratic and little damage was done. The mortars in most cases were located and dealt with by our artillery.

## 6. ARTILLERY.

## 1. Our activity.

cur general policy has been (a) to engage any favourable target which presented itself (b) by maintaining a close liaison between infantry and artillery to ensure the instant co-operation of the two arms in the case of any hostile move.

- (a) Our field artillery has engaged various enemy strong points along our front, and has daily dispersed parties of the enemy with good results. Field guns and 4'5" howitzers also bombarded portions of the enemy's wire and trenches, and the villages immediately in front of us.
- (b) The heavies have been called upon on several occasions to silence hostile batteries. In most cases they were immediately effective. They have also bombarded enemy strong points and villages in our front.

## 2. Brief report of hostile shelling.

- (a) Shelling on our front system has been below normal, but at times the enemy concentrated on definite areas. Our counter batteries usually effectively dealt with them.
- (b) Below normal. At certain periods the villages in the intermediate areas were shelled heavily.
  - (c) Negligible.
- 7. The Inter-Brigade boundary has not changed. The Divisional left boundary has altered to the following line:- I.4. (central) 0.23.b.8.5. 0.18.d.5.8. D.7.central.

# Description of Locality.

of parallel and gamely undulating sours running Northeast from this. These parallel spurs slope very gradually to the valley of the AGAMES along which runs the main German position, the HINDSGLUGG blue.

Our line runs across the forward slopes of these spurs. There is very little tree growth, the field of view is remarkable. The country is particularly suited to defence by means of concealed machine guns.

There are a number of villages in the area which constitute centres of attraction and must be defended.

Role of the Division.

2. Although the German withdrawal is caused primarily by a shortage of man, it has also been made with the probable intention of freeing troops for an offensive blow. So far those is nothing to indicate exactly whose this offensive may be expected. While it is anomabent upon us to exert continual steady pressure upon the enemy, our arrangements must take into consideration a possible counter-offensive.

Our objects are:-

(i) to advance our line until we are in a situation

from which we can sttack the HINDENBURG Line.

(ii) to arrange our dispositions in such a way as will ensure the defeat of a counter-offensive on any scale.

Policy.

The policy therefore is to consolidate the present position thoroughly. In addition it is intended to advance the front gradually and systematically by establishing posts and strongly supporting them until the Divisional line is firmly established within attacking distance of the HINDANBURG Line.

During this advance the progress of the line of posts is to be carefully controlled. The great extention of the Divisional front requires that the advance should be carefully co-ordinated.

The posts are to be established in mutually supporting localities to prevent isolated counter-attacks against individual posts.

Systems of Defence.

4. The defence is organised in depth in three systems:(1) The Advanced Line of Resistance. This will be line of outposts.

(2) The Drigade Reserve Line.

(3) The BEUGNY - YTRES Line. (The Corps Main Line.)

#### Systems of Defence Contd.

G.O's.C. Brigados in the line are responsible for the preparation of the lat. and 2md. systems.

The G.O.C. Reserve Brigade is responsible for the preparation of 3rd. system under instructions from the Divisional Commander.

The attached map shows the system of defence and the organisation of the area.

# Distribution od Infantry.

5. The position is held with two Brigades in the line and one in reserve. Each Forward Brigade has two Battalions in line. The remaining Battalions are distributed in dopth.

Each Battalion in the line holds an outpost section.

#### Details of

Defensive Organisation.

6. The Advanced line of resistance will be held against all attacks. Lewis Guns will be freely employed to ensure this. All posts are to be wired. Every post will be provided with S.O.S. signals. The supports to . the outposts will be in consolidated positions and localities. A garrison will be told off to remain in the position if the supports are called upon to reinforce the posts or to counter-attack. The Defence organisation of each Section of outposts will make arrangements to counter-attack the enemy immed--istely if the line of posts is penetrated at any point. Similar arrangements will be made to assist the flanking posts of neighbouring sections. The Brigede defence organisation will ensure that complete arrangements are made for counter-attacking the enemy at once if the outpost system is penstrated. If the counterattack is not carried out before the enemy has time to reorganise, it will have no chance of success unless carefully and deliberately prepared.

# Reserve Line.

7. The Brigede Roserve Line will be organised in a series of strongly consolidated defended localities which are capable of affording mutual support.

All villages are to be prepared for defence and definite garrisons allotted.

Conocaled machine gun positions are to be freely employed. Half the Brigade machine gun company is to be detailed to this duty.

Where machine guns from the Divisional Company are made available, the numbers allotted from the Brigade companies may be reduced by an equal number if required for forward positions, but the emplacements for the extra guns must be prepared.

Machine and Lewis Gun positions will be camouflaged when not in Infantry posts.

#### Reserve Infantry Brigade.

8. The Reserve Brigade will furnish two Battalions and Brigade Machina Gun Company for the garrison of BEDGNY - YTRES Line. Special instructions have been issued for the proparation of this line..

The remainder of the Brigade will form a mobile reserve in the hands of the Divisional Commander. It will be prepared to move at short notice.

Officers of the units of the Divisional Reserve will reconncitre the following routes forward by night as well as by day. -

(a) VELU - HERMIES.

(b) LEBUQUIERE - BEAUMETZ - DOIGNIES.

(c) MIN ROAD.

(d) BRUGNY - MORCHIES - LAGNICOURT.

artillery.

9. The artillory 3.0.8. lines will be arranged to deal with possible directions of attack instead of a complete barrage line.

The 3rd. Brigade (Army) 1.F.A. is allotted to the right forward Brigade and the 13th, Brigade 1.F.A. is allotted to the left forward Brigade.

The 14th. Brigade 1.F.A. is at the disposal of the Divisional Commander and is at present allotted a special task.

## Engineers.

10. One Field Company Engineers is allotted to each of the forward Drigades.

0.0. 1st. Pioneer Pattalion is responsible for the roads and will arrange with Divisional Headquarters for any necessary working parties.



## - ORGANISATION OF MAININGI .-

The following alterations will be made in the organ--isation for defence of the Divisional area (5/5284 dated 11th. instant.)

- HAUMETI 1. The former Brigade Reserve Line will be known as the MORCEIS HAUMETI MORCEII whine. This line will be organised by G.O.G., Reserve Brigade under the orders of the Divisional Commander.
  - 2. G.O'SC. Brigades in the line will be responsible for the organisation of the 'Porward System of defence' within their respective areas. The 'Forward Eystem' will consist of the 'advanced line' of resistance' and suppositing localities and points organised in rear of this line. The preparations of these supporting points and localities will be put in hand at once. They will be consolidated and protected by wire. The reserves of the outposts sections and the Brigade reserves of Brigades holding the 'forward eystem' will be quartered in these supporting localities. Nucleus garrisons will be told off to hold each locality in the event of the isserves being ordered to move to the support of the 'advanced line of resistance'.
- Distribution 3. The position will be held with two Brigades in of Infantry the line and one Brigade in Reserve, fach Brigade and in the line will have three battalions in the line wachine Guns. and one in Reserve.

  In the forward system of defence Lewis Gras will be employed in the advanced line or resistance and Vickers guns will be employed in the support-ing points. Machine guns will be employed in concealed positions as far as possible.
- Reserve 4. The Reserve Infantry Brigade will formish two battalions and Brigade machine gus accepany for the garraion of the bimumina o MOROBIES Line. The remainder of the Brigade will form a mobile reserve in the hands of the Divisional Commander. It will be prepared to move at short motice. Officers of all unive of the Pasanve Brigade will reconnecte the routes through both forward Brigade sectors by night as well as by day.
- HEUGHY 5. The HEUGHY YTHES Line is garmisomed by two YTHES Line. bettalions and the machine gun company of 8th. Lus. Infantry Brigade 5th. Lus. Division.
